

DR. FRANK A. WELD VISITS HIS SCHOOL

ADDRESSES STUDENTS AND FAC-ULTY ON THE REACTIONS OF A TEACHER

Mr. Frank A. Weld, former president, addressed the assembly of students and members of the faculty Wednesday morning, on the subject, "The Reactions of a Teacher." Weld was second president of Moorhead, his term of service extending over the twenty years from 1899 to 1919, more than half the period of the school's existence. He is at present editor of the American Educational Digest, makes his home at Lincoln, Neb., and came to Moorhead with Mrs. Weld to be a guest at the home of his daughter, Moselle, Mrs. O. J. Hagen.

The address concerned the effect of the profession upon the teacher herself, and thru its concreteness, sincere emotion, and clarity made a deep impression upon Mr. Weld's hearers. The profession of teaching, said Mr. Weld, is before all a concern of the mind. By her position the teacher is peculiarly compelled to be an illustration of all that she professes. Other professions stamp themselves on their adherents, none demands so much that it be livingly represented in its practitioners. The doctor may not be in robust health, the barber (Mr. Weld might have said) may have not a hair on his head; the teacher must be intellectually alive. Only thru a harmonious culture of one's being will the total effect of one upon others, that is, personality, be strong, noble, and beautiful.

Mr. Weld was also present at the Schoolmasters' Study Club monthly dinner last evening, and spoke a few words; he is to be the principal speaker this evening at the homecoming dinner in Comstock dining hall.

Members of the faculty who served as instructors during Mr. Weld's term of office will entertain in honor of Mr. and Mrs. Weld at the Gardner tomorrow night.

To the members of the Minnesota Educational Association, to the noted educators who are here to help us to solve our school problems of the near future, and to our alumnae and friends, we extend a hearty welcome. May your stay with us be profitable, and pleasant. We cannot help but be impressed and inspired by your faith in, and enthusiastic support of, and devotion to, the work which we plan to make our own. We are the real gainers because you are here.

One word which Mr. Weld employed in his gentle, beautiful address Wednesday, stood out with a freshness not usually attached to it. It was the word "culture." This particular combination of seven letters can with but small pressure be done to death. At many colleges where the aims are professedly unworldly, aesthetic, humanistic, the word becomes the commonest of intellectual coins, and like all such counters, grows worn, defaced, unimpressive. Even the thing for which it stands, recounted from behind one desk or another by the doctors of philosophy of our republic, grows inoperative thru flaccid repetition. At Moorhead the word is not so common. Culture is not spoken of daily; there are weeks which pass in which we never flear it mentioned. We are strenuously here for business; we are specializing. Culture? Ah, yes, desirable no doubt, when we have time to come out on the spacious front verandas of our minds and talk idly with the Muses. Both in utter neglect, and in tiresome reiteration there is eventual oblivion, for "culture" the word, for culture, harmonious development. The professed haunts of the culture bacillus, which long have lorded it over crasser regions, Harvard, Yale, Princeton, turn out by actual count a greater proportion of insurance, bond, and advertising salesmen than any other one species of citizen. These nobly cultivated gentlemen proceed to get while the getting's good, add to the culture of the world by patronizing the night clubs and revues of the big cities, and reveal their lofty taste by being 100 per cent for Edward Guest, and the other jingling purveyors of sentiment. The littler places, like Moorhead, trying to do more and talk less, occasionally fail to mention and meet the most important things, but a Mr. Weld comes along, brings a host of significance straight to the heart of us, and culture, that beautiful thing, is neither talked about for a time, then forgotten, nor utterly ignored, but kept in the inner part of us, to flourish, to move, to preserve our souls' integrity.

"FOOT-NOTES"

An important book recently acquired by the college library is "North America," by Joseph Russell Smith, professor of economic geography, Columbia University, since 1919, and prior to that on the staff of the Wharton School of Finance and Commerce, Pennsylvania. The complete title of the book is "North America; its people and the resources, development, and prospects of the continent as an agricultural, industrial, and commercial area." Its title page is ambitious but its over 800 pages justify the presumption. The book has received favorable notices in the geographic papers, and on account of its readable style and general interest has earned complimentary remarks in the Boston Transcript, New York Tribune, and New Republic. Its material is voluminous but interesting; it is a pioneer in the field of writing on economic geography; it will be valuable for college students of geography and for others who desire an understanding of the present state and possible future of the continent on which they live.
