D. Corrick moved, W. Wesley seconded, to approve the substitution of a statement introduced by Dr. Corrick in place of General Studies recommendation 9a. N. Whyatt moved, M. Moore seconded, to strike the last paragraph of the statement. Motion to amend statement carried. Motion to approve entire statement as amended carried, 1 opposed.

- 9b. The course should present more than a knowledge base. The course must deal with more than technique.
- W. Wesley moved, R. Szeitz seconded, to approve recommendation 9c. Molly Moore moved, Margaret Moore seconded, to delete the clause "or are there other courses within the discipline better suited to this purpose?" from the paragraph. Amended motion carried unanimously.
 - 9c. The course should be central to the discipline. One test question will be: would this course contribute significantly to a liberal arts education? Another question will be: is this a course that the department recommends to other advisers as one that truly represents the discipline's contribution to the liberal arts?
