MOORHEAD STATE TEACHERS COLLEGE

- Regular classwork and every college activity will be carried on next year with
 the same standards as in the past. Three modern buildings and eight
 training schools provide facilities for this work. It is expected that some
 new structures will be begun next year to take the place of those lost in
 the fire last February.
- 2. The College offers a combination of cultural and professional training.
- It prepares teachers, supervisors, and administrators for elementary schools, junior high schools and senior high schools.
- There are 30 student organizations—social, professional, dramatic, athletic, and departmental—to provide for every interest.
- Its athletic teams stand high in the Interstate Conference; its work in music, dramatics, debate, and publications compares favorably with that of any college of similar size.
- The College is accredited as "Class A" (highest rating possible) by the American Association of Teachers Colleges. The North Central Conference has also accredited the school.
- 7. Tuition is free for those who declare their intention to teach.
- 8. The small registration fees provide for lyceum, athletic contests, entertainments, medical supervision, publications, and the use of textbooks.
- The bachelor's degree is given for the four-year course; the advanced diploma, for the two-year course. Completion of either course entitles the student to a certificate from the state.

DRAMATICS AND FORENSICS

THE PHYSICAL PLANT

Besides the buildings pictured above, Weld Hall, shown on page 2, contains a large auditorium with complete stage equipment; 18 classrooms and laboratories; and the library.

On the first floor of Wheeler Hall are located the executive offices. The remainder of this building and all of Comstock Hall are used for women's dormitories, providing living quarters for approximately two hundred women.

The Student Exchange, built by the alumni, students, and faculty, is 40 by 90 feet, and contains the students' postoffice, store, telephone exchange, locker rooms, girls gymnasium, and the social hall.

The Moorhead Armory provides a large playing floor for basketball, used by M.S.T.C. and Concordia college.

Memorial Athletic Field comprises one of the best football gridirons in the Northwest, a quarter-mile track, a baseball diamond, tennis courts, a dressing and shower room, and adequate bleachers for 1,000 spectators.

One of the measures of a school is the spirit of its product, the alumni. M.S.T.C. is proud of the Alumni Association, incorporated, which immediately raised the necessary funds to purchase residences to take the place of the Training School lost in the fire of February 9, and then set to work erecting the Students Exchange building.



WHY OUR GRADUATES ARE SUCCESSFUL TEACHERS

Students of Moorhead State Teachers College go out from the institution with a year of teaching experience in the case of four-year graduates. Those taking the two-year course do part time teaching for two terms as compared with the three terms of the four-year graduates. Rural students do six weeks of full-time teaching and observation. This practical work done here has caused M.S.T.C. to be designated as one of the "Schools That Are Prophecies" by the Journal of the National Education Association.

Above are pictured six of the eight training schools of Moorhead State Teachers College. The residences in the upper left-hand corner were purchased by the Alumni Association and rented to the College to serve as the College Training School. These six residences (only four are shown in the picture) will probably be sold to various organizations on the campus for dormitories or fraternity houses when the new Training School building is completed.
