The State Teachers College Band is an active unit. It plays for all of the athletic contests, broadcasts, and gives numerous concerts both on and off the campus.

Two of the outstanding accomplishments of the Band last year were: Winning the Hudson's Bay Company Shield as a result of its "commendable work" in the Manitoba Musical Competition Festival held at Winnipeg, and playing before an overcrowded auditorium when it opened the Annual Arts Festival here with a grand concert.

The Band is handled like any other class. Rehearsals are held during the day and credit is given for successful work.

Since its beginning two and a half years ago when it started with fourteen members and almost no equipment, the Band has grown into an organization of thirty-five members with an equipment valued at several thousand dollars.
