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THE PLAN OF THE 1933 SUMMER SESSION

The regular summer session at the Moorhead State Teachers College opens Monday, June 12, and closes on Friday, July 21. Following this term, a few extension courses will be offered, primarily for those regularly enrolled on the campus who are working toward their degrees. These courses will begin on Monday, July 24, and close Thursday, August 24. Those who take both the courses of the six-weeks session and the extension period are thus enabled to complete a full quarter of work.

The complete schedule of courses for the six-weeks session is printed on the last page of this bulletin. For a description of these courses, the reader is referred to the College catalog, a copy of which will be sent on request. The courses listed for the extension term of five weeks will be given on condition that there are at least twelve students enrolled in the particular course in question.

During the regular session, all students regularly enrolled carry two courses, each of which meets for a double period for four days a week. The same plan is carried out for the extension courses, except that each class meets for five days a week. Each course offered carries four quarter hours of credit, the normal load being eight quarter hours of work.

The wide range of subjects will satisfy the needs and interests of all. The experienced teacher who desires to improve his status, a desirable goal particularly in the present economic conditions, will find professional courses that will reveal present day trends and demands in education. One primarily interested in cultural studies as an aid to a broader preparation will find many attractive offerings in music, art, and literature.

The courses scheduled may be applied on the requirements of (1) the four-year degree curriculum; (2) the two-year standard diploma; or (3) required work for renewal of limited elementary certificates.

MOORHEAD TEACHERS COLLEGE STANDARDS

Moorhead State Teachers College is maintained by the State of Minnesota for the training of teachers for the public schools of the state. The institution is a member of the American Association of Teachers Colleges, Class A. Credits earned at Moorhead are accepted by other colleges in so far as such credits meet established requirements.

The various curricula are organized to meet the specific requirements for teachers certificates in Minnesota. All certificates in Minnesota are issued through the State Department of Education and are based on the completion of definite courses of training. Each curriculum is arranged on the basis of (1) constants, (2) variables, and (3) electives.

The variables put the emphasis on one of the following fields:

Elementary—rural, primary, intermediate, upper grades.

High School—junior, senior.

In accordance with this plan, Minnesota certificates of different grades

qualify the holders to teach in the elementary school, the junior high school and the senior high school. Credits earned at Moorhead Teachers College are generally accepted by other states as meeting their requirements for the endorsement or renewal of certificates.

The summer school is cared for by the regular staff. The management of dormitories, the health supervision of the students, and classroom instruction are in the hands of regular members of the college staff.

RECREATION AND ENTERTAINMENT

LYCEUM. Again this summer there will be a number of lecturers on educational and literary topics, in addition to a few evening programs by visiting artists.

TOURS AND FIELD TRIPS. Under the direction of the Geography department there will be a College tour to the Century of Progress Exposition (World's Fair) in Chicago at the close of the regular six-weeks session, the dates being July 21-31 inclusive. The price of \$44 includes all expenses of transportation, meals and lodging. Again the College will sponsor a tour of Northern Minnesota and Lake Superior, touching on Itasca state park, the Iron Range, and Duluth, this being scheduled for the weekend of the Fourth of July recess. A number of shorter tours to points of local interest are also being arranged.

PHYSICAL EDUCATION. These are times when we must all talk economy. The Physical Education department practices it as well. How?

1. You may save time by earning one of your required credits in physical education in addition to the usual student load.
2. You may learn to swim this summer as one method of earning this credit, or just for fun. It costs no extra fee. You need furnish absolutely nothing.
3. There are at least six other interesting ways to get the credit. Let us tell you about them.
4. Bring your gym shoes, some sport clothes, a tennis racket or at least a jumping rope. Let us demonstrate how to be happy and healthy though poor.
5. Clay County Play Day this summer! Right here at the College! This is your chance to see how it is done, or, if you like, to help do it, so that you may try the play activities in your community next year.

THE COACHING SCHOOL. Late in the summer, from August 21 to 26 inclusive the fourth annual coaching school, under the supervision of the director of athletics, will feature Heartley Anderson, head football coach at Notre Dame; H. G. Olson, head basketball coach at Ohio State; Dave Woodward, University of Minnesota trainer; and Chuck Taylor, professional basketball star.

ADMISSION AND CREDITS

The College reserves the right to accept or reject any applicant for admission on the basis of health, character, and fitness for teaching. These are regarded as prerequisites for admission.

Applicants holding a diploma from an accredited high school will be admitted to collegiate courses without examinations, provided they submit a transcript of their high school record. It is desirable to mail this transcript to the registrar prior to registration day, June 12.

Students who have attended other colleges must have their college transcripts sent to the registrar ten days prior to registration.

Holders of first or second grade certificates will be admitted during the summer term to first year college classes. Professional credits may be earned to meet renewal requirements.

A student may register for eight quarter hours during the summer session in addition to work in Physical Education. The work done in any one course is equivalent to work done in that course during the fall, winter, or spring quarters.

REGISTRATION AND FEES

Registration will begin Monday morning, June 12 at 9:00 o'clock and continue throughout the day. Class work will begin with the first period on Tuesday, June 13. Except by special arrangement there will be no registration after Tuesday.

For the regular six-weeks session there is a fee of \$6.00 which covers the loan of text-books as well as the incidental fees for lyceum, registration and other activities. Non-residents of Minnesota who have not been taking teacher training at the Moorhead State Teachers College during the past two years will be charged tuition of \$5.00 for the six weeks session in addition to the regular \$6.00 fees.

The fees for the extension courses following the regular session are \$10.00 for each course. Text-books are supplied for these courses as in the regular session.

Payments of all college accounts should be made in cash. Checks will be accepted at the business office of the college for collection only. **ALL ACCOUNTS ARE PAYABLE IN ADVANCE.**

A deposit of \$5.00 with the application of each individual is required to secure a reservation of a room. This amount will be applied on the rent for the first month. Make draft or money order payable to Moorhead State Teachers College.

In case the applicant does not wish to occupy the room the fee will be returned, provided the reservation is withdrawn ten days before the opening of the term.

LIVING ACCOMMODATIONS

There are on the campus living accommodations for both men and women. The two residence halls, Wheeler and Comstock, provide by far the best living conditions for women. They are located near to class activity and campus interests; in summer the large brick buildings are cool and pleasant; the dining room, the coolest spot in Moorhead, provides an attractive, comfortable place to take one's meals. The bathrooms with their new modern plumbing are supplied with hot water each day. The redecorating and refurnishing of the rooms and parlors make these homes comfortable and attractive.

For the summer session room rental will be as follows:

4th floor rooms, two to a room.....\$6.00 for the six weeks period
2nd and 3rd floor, two to a room.....\$7.50 for the six weeks period
1st floor rooms, two to a room.....\$9.00 for the six weeks period
Single rooms may be had for two dollars extra for the six weeks period.

The men's hall was made available for the men through the reconstruction of the old Exchange building. In addition to the supervisor, twenty-six men make their home in the hall. Twin beds for each room is a feature of the bedroom furnishings. A large parlor in which is the usual furniture, including a piano, adds to the happiness and congeniality of the group. The small number of rooms available, the fact that the hall has been filled to capacity from the beginning, and the low rental charges, make it advisable for those desiring rooms for the summer session to make their applications early. For the entire six-weeks summer term rental charges per person will be \$6.00 and \$7.50, depending upon whether side or corner room is selected.

It is expected that those who room in the men's residence hall will take their meals in the campus dining room in Comstock hall.

Board for women and men will be charged for at the following rates:

3 meals per day, 7 days per week.....\$24.00 for the six weeks period
3 meals per day, 5 days per week.....\$21.00 for the six weeks period

No reduction or refunds will be made for absences of less than one week.

Those living off-campus may have the privilege of dining in the Hall at the same rates as resident students.

Any off-campus rooms must be secured from the approved lists in the offices of the dean of women or the dean of men.
