PLANNING AN IDEAL SUMMER

With a schedule of courses and activities built around the needs of the teacher who is desirous of improving his or her educational status, together with those students of the regular year who wish to earn extra credits or make up missing credits, the 1936 summer session of the Moorhead State Teachers College opens June 15.

Closing July 24, there is left a sufficient time for travel, outing and rest before the fall term of school begins. With placement of qualified teachers again reaching high levels, it is evident that a summer well apportioned between study and recreation is a desirable goal for teachers who do not yet have their degrees or standard diplomas as well as for those who wish to do special work that will make their teaching load lighter to carry and more enjoyable during the next year.

Plan to come to the campus this summer for a delightful six weeks of inspiration that comes from a change of environment, from contact with leading specialists in many fields, from stimulating talks and enjoyable concerts. Come with the idea of having a good, friendly time on a friendly campus while you work. Bring along an associate or a group of associates from your vicinity. You will enjoy the cool, air-conditioned, spic-and-span classrooms and laboratories on warm days; the shady nooks on the campus; a plunge into the beautiful tiled swimming pool; a game of tennis on one of the four brand new courts; study in the well-stocked, roomy libraries; attractively served meals in the dining hall; and the fellowship of college life on a modern campus.



Delightful Summer Living in the Dormitories

LIVING ACCOMODATIONS

There are on the campus living accommodations for both men and women. The two residence halls, Wheeler and Comstock, provide by far the best living conditions for women. They are located near to class activity and campus interests; in summer the large brick buildings are cool and pleasnant; the dining room, the coolest spot in Moorhead, provides an attractive, comfortable place to take one's meals. The bathrooms with their new modern plumbing are supplied with hot water each day. The redecorating and refurnishing of the rooms and parlors make these homes comfortable and attractive.

A deposit of \$5.00 with the application of each individual is required to secure a reservation of a room. This amount will be applied on the rent for the first month. Make draft or money order payable to Moorhead State Teachers College.

In case the applicant does not wish to occupy the room the fee will be returned, provided the reservation is withdrawn ten days before the opening of the term.

For the summer session room rental will be as follows:
4th floor rooms, two to a room......\$6.00 each for the six weeks
2nd and 3rd floor, two to a room......\$7.50 each for the six weeks
1st floor rooms, two to a room......\$9.00 each for the six weeks
Single rooms may be had for two dollars extra for the six weeks.

The men's hall was made available for the men through the reconstruction of the old Exchange building. In addition to the supervisor, twenty-six men make their home in the hall. Twin beds for each room is a feature of the bed-

THE PLAN OF THE 1936 SUMMER SESSION

The summer session at the Moorhead State Teachers College opens Mony, June 15 and closes on Friday, July 24. The tentative schedule of courses the six-week session is printed on the last page of this bulletin. For a description of these courses, the reader is referred to the College catalog, a copy which will be sent on request.

During the session all students regularly enrolled carry eight quarter hours work. The courses offered are four-hour courses. Each class meets fourness a week for double periods. Physical Education or Applied Music may taken in addition to the eight-hour load. Students may carn a full term credit Physical Education.

The wide range of subjects and the recreational opportunities will satisfy a needs and interests of all. The experienced teacher who desires to improve a status will find professional courses that will reveal present trends and deands in education. One primarily interested in cultural studies as an aid to proader preparation will find many attractive offerings in music, art, and litture. Rural teachers who need credits for the renewal of their limited elementary certificates will find interesting courses which will count both toward to renewal and toward the standard two-year diploma. Normal training aduates since 1929 need fifteen quarter hours to renew their certificates, eight which may be earned in one summer session.

In brief, the courses scheduled may be applied on the requirements of (1) a four-year degree curriculum; (2) the two-year standard diploma; (3) required work for renewal of limited elementary certificates.

MOORHEAD TEACHERS COLLEGE STANDARDS

Moorhead State Teachers College is maintained by the State of Minnea for the training of teachers for the public schools of the state. The titution is a member of the American Association of Teachers Colleges, edits earned at Moorhead are accepted by other colleges in so far as such dits meet established requirements.

The various curricula are organized to meet the specific requirements teachers certificates in Minnesota. All certificates in Minnesota are issued rough the State Department of Education and are based on the completion definite courses of training. Each curriculum is arranged on the basis of constants, (2) variables, and (3) electives.

The variables put the emphasis on one of the following fields:

Elementary (including primary, intermediate and rural) Secondary (including junior and senior high school)

In accordance with this plan, Minnesota certificates of different grades alify the holders to teach in the elementary school, the junior high school

d the senior high school. Credits earned at Moorhead Teachers College generally accepted by other states as meeting their requirements for the dorsement or renewal of certificates.

The summer school is cared for by the regular staff. The management of rmitories, the health supervision of the students, and classroom instruction in the hands of regular members of the college staff.

RECREATION AND SPECIAL FEATURES

- A. Lectures and Entertainment. A series of speakers and entertainment will be brought to the college during the summer. In this way students will be kept in touch with the best in thought and art from the wide world in which we are a part. The following outline is indicative of the high quality:
 - Paul Fleming, the magician. This is the platform name for Paul Fleming Gemmell, Ph. D., professor of Economics, University of Pennsylvania. His program will be an evening of magic.
 - Dr. No-Yong Park, noted Chinese lecturer, will speak on the Pacific and Far East affairs.
 - A concert violinist of national reputation—member of a noted orchestra.
 - 4. National speaker to be supplied by the Jewish Chautaugua Society.
- B. A Program of Physical Recreation and Social Fun. Informal parties, pienics and games, and excursions. A representative student committee is chosen early in the term to advise what social entertainments are most preferred and to help arrange them.
- C. Exhibits and Demonstrations. These are intended to supplement and enrich methods classes. No student teaching credits will be offered during the summer session.
 - School for Primary children—Miss Olga Korsbrek—two weeks, June 22 to July 3. Primary methods including beginning reading and playground methods.
 - Middle school—Miss Marie Sorknes—two weeks, July 6 to July 17, demonstrating intermediate methods and playground activities.
 - 3. School exhibits illustrating progressive school standards.
 - Exhibits and demonstrations of youth activities as promoted by Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, Camp Fire Girls, Junior Red Cross, Parent Teacher Associations, 4-H Clubs, Girl Reserves, etc.—fifth week, July 13-17.
- D. Purely Personal. Remember to bring along tennis shoes, rackets, golf clubs, ball gloves and other such items of equipment, because you will probably want to use them. Physical education is organized as closely around individual tastes and preferences as possible. Besides swimming and tennis, there is shuffleboard, Badminton, folk dancing, ping pong, archery, horse shoes, and kittenball. The college furnishes all equipment for swimming, including suits, caps, towels, etc., at no additional cost to the regularly enrolled student.

room furnishings. A large parlor in which is the usual furniture, including a piano, adds to the happiness and congeniality of the group. The small number of rooms available, the fact that the hall has been filled to capacity from the beginning, and the low rental charges, make it advisable for those desiring rooms for the summer session to make their application early. For the entire six-weeks summer term, rental charges per person will be \$6.00 and \$7.50, depending upon whether side or corner room is selected.

It is expected that those who room in the residence halls will take their

meals in the campus dining room in Comstock Hall.

No reduction or refunds will be made for absences of less than one week. Those living off-campus may have the privilege of dining in the Hall at the same rates as resident students.

Any off-campus rooms must be secured from the approved list in the offices of the dean of women or the dean of men.

ADMISSION AND CREDITS

The College reserves the right to accept or reject any applicant for admission on the basis of health, character, and fitness for teaching. These are regarded as prerequisites for admission.

Applicants holding a diploma from an accredited high school will be admitted to collegiate courses without examinations, provided they submit a transcript of their high school record. It is desirable to mail this transcript to the registrar prior to registration day, June 15. Credits will be withheld from students who do not present entrance credits.

Students who have attended other colleges must have their college transcripts sent to the registrar ten days prior to registration.

Holders of first grade certificates will be admitted during the summer session to first year college classes. Professional credits may thus be earned to meet renewal requirements.

Holders of limited elementary certificates based on work taken at a high school normal training department or a Minnesota Teachers College may take work toward the completion of their standard two-year diploma or toward a degree, if their credits have been filed with the registrar.

REGISTRATION AND FEES

Registration will begin Monday morning, June 15, at 9:00 o'clock and continue through the day. Class work will begin with the first period on Tuesday, June 16. Except by very special arrangement with the president there will be no registration after Tuesday. Students who do not complete registration on Monday will be charged the regular late fees in addition to the tuition.

The fee for the six-week session is \$13.50. This covers the loan of text-books as well as the incidental fees for lyceum, registration and other activities. Non-residents of Minnesota will be charged tuition of \$5.00 in addition to the regular \$13.50.

Private lessons in voice, piano, or violin will be \$12.00 for the six-week period. Ten lessons are given, one lesson a week during the first and last weeks and two lessons the other weeks. Pianos may be rented at the college for one or two hours a day.

Payment of all college accounts should be made in cash, money orders, or cashiers checks. Personal checks will be accepted for collection only. ALL ACCOUNTS ARE PAYABLE IN ADVANCE.
