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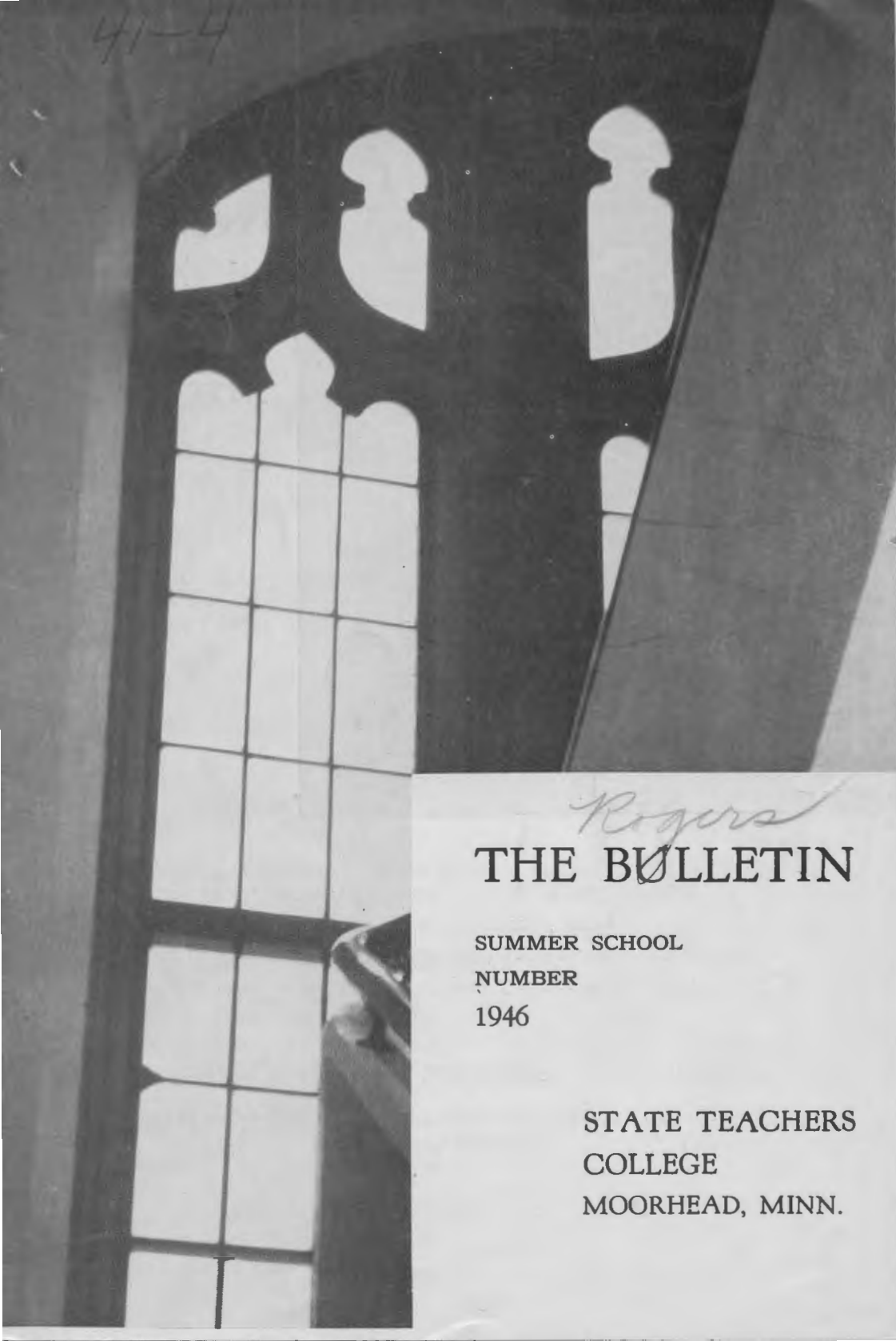

Monday, June 10.

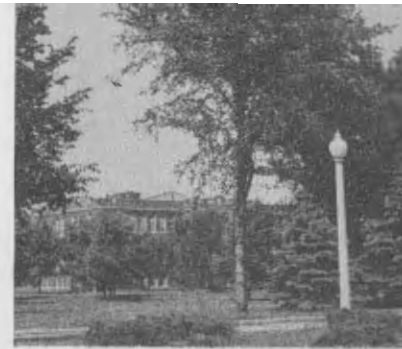

WORKSHOPS THIS SUMMER

Since children will be enrolled this summer in the college Elementary School, laboratory facilities will be available for student teaching and for the three summer workshops. Enrollment in each of the 8 hour workshops will be limited to 70, assigned in order of application. Application blanks are available by writing to the Registrar.

HELPING TEACHERS UNDERSTAND CHILDREN

A full-time workshop for experienced teachers; an opportunity to organize a wealth of information on child development and behavior, to practice some new and effective methods of applying this understanding, and to work on individual problems. June 10 to July 12. 8 hours credit.



HELPING TEACHERS IMPROVE THE READING PROGRAM

A full-time workshop with individual opportunity to work on reading problems and remedial measures at the primary, intermediate, and high school levels, with specialized consultants available for each level, featuring full-time service of Dr. McCallister (Herzl Junior College, Chicago), a nationally recognized authority in the teaching of reading. July 15 to August 16. 8 hours credit.

JUNIOR RED CROSS WORKSHOP

A full-time workshop open with or without credit to any one interested in the Red Cross program for young people in grades 7-11. Representative members of the J. R. C. will be on campus for one week to provide experience in Red Cross production; other activities will include instruction and demonstrations, field trips, first aid, water safety, and audio-visual aids. July 22 to August 2. 1 hour credit.

Students desiring consideration for advanced credit should file an official copy of their records early so that they may be evaluated prior to the opening of the Summer Quarter.
