TUITION AND FEES

Tuition. — The charge for tuition is \$10 for the Summer Quarter and \$10 for the Short Session. Out of state residents pay an additional charge of \$5.00 for either the Summer Quarter or the Short Session.

Fees. — The activity fee for the Summer Quarter is \$8.00 and for the Short Session, \$5.00. A small laboratory fee is charged for the use of materials in certain courses. Date of registration-Monday, June 10. Classes begin Tuesday, June 11.

Full summer quarter— June 10 to Aug. 16.

Short session-June 10 to July 12.

Registration for the Fall Quarter will begin Sept. 3, 1946.

WORKSHOPS THIS SUMMER

Since children will be enrolled this summer in the college Elementary School, laboratory facilities will be available for student teaching and for the three summer workshops. Enrollment in each of the 8 hour workshops will be limited to 70, assigned in order of application. Application blanks are available by writing to the Registrar.

HELPING TEACHERS UNDERSTAND CHILDREN

A full-time workshop for experienced teachers; an opportunity to organize a wealth of information on child development and behavior, to practice some new and effective methods of applying this understanding, and to work on individual problems. June 10 to July 12. 8 hours credit.

HELPING TEACHERS IMPROVE THE READING PROGRAM

A full-time workshop with individual opportunity to work on reading problems and remedial measures at the primary, intermediate, and high school levels, with specialized consultants available for each level, featuring full-time service of Dr. Mc-Callister (Herzl Junior College, Chicago), a nationally recognized authority in the teaching of reading. July 15 to August 16. 8 hours credit.
