Moorhead Cage Quint Will Attempt To Spoil Duluth Team's Record

Nemzek Pleased With Team's Spirit, Must Expect A Fast, Flashy Game

Fresh from a thrilling 49-35 victory over the highly-touted Mayville Comets last Friday night, the speedy Dragon quintet will meet its crucial test tonight against the powerful Duluth Bulldogs. The game is scheduled for 8:15 an indication are that the Dragon freshmen will play a preliminary with an opponent not yet selected.

With both teams flashing a powerful offense, a high scoring game is predicted, making it a most enjoyable game from the spectator's viewpoint. Coach Alex J. Nemzek has been polishing up the Dragon defense, which was a trifle lax in the Mayville encounter and it is believed this will constitute a vital factor in deciding the game's outcome.

Members of the Duluth squad are not gants n stature but are exceedingly fast, more than making up for the above deficiency. Led by the high-scoring "Sonny" Visinovich, the Bulldogs will present a smooth passing, fast breaking team that will only bow to a superior team. It is hoped that is just what the Dragons are.

Coach Nemzek was pleased with the added spirit and drive that his charges showed in the Mayville game, especially with Harold Matson, who regained his shooting eye by scoring 15 points.

The Dragon lineup is expected to have Captain Carl Fridlund and Ken Thompson or Bud LeGrande at guards, Wally Erickson at center and Harold Matson and Herby Lang at the forward posts. Those who will be ready for any emergency include DuVall, Rasmussen, Rife, Christensen and Elstad.

Dragons Manage To Down Mayville 49-35

Moorhead Ragged During First Half; Mayville Puts Up Stubborn Fight

The Dragons pulled out of free-scoring basketball game last Friday night with a 49-35 victory over the Mayville State T. C. five. This was the first game played between these teams for a period of two years.

Throughout the entire first half the Dragon attack functioned inconsistently, but as the period closed they led 22-19. Five times during the first half the score was tied, Mayville, however, holding the lead only once. The score was tied at 16-16 when Luckasen made a free throw to put them ahead, but Matson dribbled in to score, putting the Dragons ahead for the rest of the evening.

Cliff Rasmussen, lanky Dragon center, and Odis Legrand, Dragon guard, went on a rampage at the outset of the second half and mounted the score up to 45-28 for the Dragons before the Comets counted seven points to bring their total to 35. Matson and Erickson added three points for the Dragons as the game closed.

Matson slipped back into his old-time form to lead his mates in scoring, counting five field goals and as many free throws for a total of 15 points. Mayville's main threat was Luckasen, who garnered 18 points by his peculiar pivot shots and wicked eye at the free throw line. Stolt, young baseball player, played a good game and was second high for the Comets.

Alumnus Employed In Forestry Service

Clare Hallack, '33, Appears in Baritone Recital at Billings

James Tye, B. E., '34, is employed in the office of Lake States Forestry Department, which is a division of the forestry between the state and federal departments. The office is planning to move to Madison, Wisconsin, the first of April, when Mr. Tye expects to begin work on his M. A. degree at the University of Wisconsin.

"The project we are working on just now is a forest survey," he says. "By the use of sample plots of one-fifth acre which are divided and subdivided into fortieths and hundredths, and which are taken at intervals of ten miles north and south and twenty chains east and west in all of the timbered and brush areas of these states we are able to estimate their volume of timber in cubic and board feet. However, this is only a small amount of the information that is gathered. We, who are in the office, have the task of compiling this data into tables, graphs, and other such useful forms."

The above statements were taken from Mr. Tye's letter to his fraternity brothers in Alpha Epsilon.

Mr. Hallack graduated from the music department of this college in 1933 and has studied voice with Daniel L. Preston at the College and J. W. Stephens of Minneapolis.

This is Mr. Hallack's second year of teaching at the Polytechnic institute; he is also the faculty adviser of the Polytechnic publications.

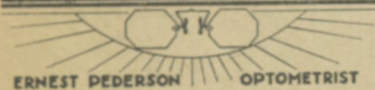
