The Sunken Bell

By GERHART HAUPTMANN "Strangely entangled seems the web of souls."

CHARACTERS OF THE PLAY

Heinrich, a bell-founder, age 30. Magda, his wife. Two boys, their children, age 5 and 9. The Vicar of the village. Old Wittikin, a wise woman of the mountains. Rautendelein, her elfin grand-daughter, fairest of women. The Nickelmann, a mountain creature who loves Rautendelein.

The action:—In a remote period.

The location:—The mountains and the village below.
The motif:—To the literal man a primrose but a primrose is; to the imaginative it is what he has the power to see therein. Heinrich, the bell-founder, makes bells that are cracked, misshapen and false. But he dreams of a bell, so perfect in tone, so far-reaching that when erected upon the mountain peak it may resound throughout the world, till the very Sun re-echos its grand peal. It shall be called the Sun-Bell. But what will aid him to fashion the wondrous chime? Is it the narrow round of the village with the Vicar, the School-master, the Barber and the home life? Or will the free air of the mountains offer more? Vowing to accomplish his purpose he says, with face uplifted towards the Sun: "I offer thee myself, and all I am." What that offer involves constitutes the story of the Play.

Dido, an Epic Tragedy

Presented April Fighteenth and Twentieth

Foreword

After the fall of Troy, Aeneas, the son of Venus, led his band of Trojan exiles westward. At the end of seven years wandering by land and sea they approached the shores of Africa. Here a violent storm arose, which scattered and all but destroyed the Trojan ships. Cast upon the desert coast, Aeneas and his friend Achates, believing their comrades to be lost, set forth to explore the land, and came to the newly founded city of Carthage, whose protectress was the goddess Juno. Later the rest of the Trojan band find their way hither.

The city was ruled by Queen Dido, who had fled from her native Tyre because her brother had slain Sychaeus, her husband. "And to the land of Africa had she come and built her a city, even the city of Carthage." So these two, Aeneas, Prince of Troy, and Dido, fugitive from Tyre, meet in distant Africa and live the romance which fate had held in store.

Now it so happened that Jove, ruler of the gods, had willed that the Trojans build a new kingdom in Italy. To do this Aeneas must leave Carthage. Hence the romance ends in tragedy.

The Course of the Play

ACT I. Dawn. The Temple of Juno in Carthage. Greetings to the Dawn. Aeneas and Achates, attracted by the singing, meet Venus. Enter Dido and her train. They welcome the Trojans with festivities. Dido and Aeneas pledge friendship.

ACT II. Scene I. Dido's Chamber. Beside the Shrine of Sychaeus, her dead husband, Dido reveals to Anna, her sister, her love for Aeneas.

Scene 2. A Forest Glade. Juno, protectress of Carthage, fearing the fated supremacy of the Trojans in Italy, makes a compact with Venus, protectress of Aeneas, to locate the Trojan power in Carthage rather than in Rome.

ACT III. The Open Square before the Temple of Jupiter. Iarbus, the Moorish prince, and rejected suitor for Dido's hand, defies the gods. Enter Aeneas and his companions tracing the plan of the new citadel of Carthage. Mercury appears with the message from the gods commanding Aeneas to set sail for Italy. Aeneas forsakes Dido. Dido's denunciation.

ACT IV. Dido's Bower Overlooking the Sea. Shouts of the Trojan Sailors are heard. Dido's grief culminates in her death. Descent of Iris, messenger of the goddesses, to free her spirit.
